

Early Childhood Policy Internship

- Internship Description -

Position

The Early Childhood Policy (ECP) internship is a hands-on learning experience offering meaningful and practical work related to the student's career interest in a professional environment. The internship will allow the student the opportunity to deeply engage in current early childhood education policy issues and state-level early childhood education reform. Graduate students working toward a master's degree in public policy, public administration, or a similar field are encouraged to apply.

The Hunt Institute's ECP Intern will work directly with The Institute's Senior Director of Early Learning and Policy Team to develop and execute projects that will advance the organization's agenda. Assigned projects are based on the intern's qualifications as well as the needs of the organization.

This internship can be part-time (10-20 hours per week) or full-time; part-time does have flexibility to be coordinated around class commitments. Interns will receive an hourly rate, and class credit can also be arranged. The preferred summer internship term is late May 2021 – August 2021; for fall internships, the preferred term is late August 2021 – December 2021.

Responsibilities

- Gather and track data to inform The Institute's early childhood education policy work with current and emerging leaders across the country.
- Perform state-specific research to inform development of new materials and activities with policymakers.
- Research and track assigned early childhood education policy issues and create resources for internal use.
- Analyze legislation/publications and create synopses and recommendations.
- Provide on-site support at Institute events as needed.
- Other duties as assigned.

Qualifications

- Demonstrated secondary research skills in accessing information online, via phone outreach, and at libraries and media centers.
- Familiarity with, and interest in, early childhood education.
- Familiarity with, and interest in, education policy.
- Ability to synthesize information and present findings or recommendations to stakeholders.
- Excellent interpersonal, verbal, and written communication skills.
- Proficiency in Microsoft Word, Excel, and PowerPoint.
- Experience with Tableau and statistical software a plus.
- Ability to prioritize, multi-task, and maintain attention to detail with competing priorities.
- Effective project management and time management skills.
- Ability to work both independently and as part of a team.
- Ideal candidates will demonstrate resourcefulness, good judgement, and willingness to communicate and ask questions when needed.
- Current enrollment in an undergraduate or graduate program.
