The Honorable Kirsten Baesler
State Superintendent of Public Instruction, North Dakota Department of Public Instruction |
Hunt-Kean Leadership Fellow Cohort 6

Kirsten Baesler is the state school superintendent and administrator of the North Dakota Department of Public Instruction. The Superintendent and her team have led significant improvements in the graduation rates and academic success of the state's Native American students, improved access to quality early childhood programs, and greater access to computer science and cybersecurity instruction in grades K-12. Before taking office in January 2013, Superintendent Baesler had a 24-year career in the Bismarck Public School system—the state's largest school district—as a vice principal, library media specialist, classroom teacher, and instructional assistant. Superintendent Baesler also spent nine years as an elected member of the Mandan School Board. She was board president for seven of those nine years. In November 2022, Superintendent Baesler became president of the Council of Chief State School Officers, representing state education organizations nationwide. Superintendent Baesler serves on more than a dozen North Dakota state boards, was one of 25 leaders chosen from across the country for the Governing Institute's Women in Government Leadership Program, and is a Hunt-Kean Leadership Fellow.



The Honorable Michelle Axtman *Senate District 7, North Dakota State Senate*

Senator Michelle Axtman serves as a member of the North Dakota Senate for the 7th district. Senator Axtman earned a Bachelor of Science degree in geospatial science from the United States Air Force Academy and a Master of Science in project management from the University of Mary. Senator Axtman served as an active-duty pilot in the United States Air Force and Air Force Reserve Command for twelve years, reaching the rank of major. Since 2021, she has served as the executive officer to the commander of the 934th Airlift Wing. Senator Axtman was elected to the North Dakota Senate in November 2022.



The Honorable Glenn BoschHouse Assistant Majority Leader, House District 30, North Dakota House of Representatives |

Glenn Bosch is a Representative for North Dakota's 30th District. He has served in the House since 2017 and is the Majority Caucus Leader. He is a retired Executive Vice President of AVI Systems and the Co-Owner of Bismarck Larks Baseball Club.

He also donates much of his time to serving on community boards including: Prairie Public Broadcasting, Act Up Theatre, FM Coalition for Homeless Persons, the Fargo Theatre, and ND Council of Abused Women's Services.



The Honorable Ryan Braunberger

Senate Minority Caucus Leader, Senate District 10, North Dakota State Senate

Ryan Braunberger was elected to the North Dakota State Senate in November 2022, becoming the first Senator for the new District 10 in Fargo. As one of only four Democratic Senators in the state, he served on the Judiciary and State and Local Government Committees, making a significant impact on legislation. Braunberger's commitment to fairness and justice has earned him praise from constituents. He champions progressive values and advocates for North Dakota citizens' well-being. As a freshman Senator, he also serves as the Democratic-NPL Caucus Chair. Braunberger graduated Magna Cum Laude from Minnesota State University Moorhead with a bachelor's degree in social work and holds an Associate of Applied Sciences in Business Administration from Southeast Technical Institute. He is a member of the National Association of Social Work.



The Honorable David Hogue

Dr. Marcus Lewton was named Superintendent of Dickinson Public Schools in December 2021 after serving as Interim Superintendent from July 2021-December 2021. Dr. Mackey's scholarship examines the effects of structural inequity in Indigenous and other marginalized populations in educational leadership and public policy which she uses to advocate nationally for Tribal sovereignty and self-determination in education.

They hold an MSOD and BA in Political Science from American University, focusing on Native leadership development throughout their career.



The Honorable Molly Spearman

South Carolina State Superintendent of Education (2015-2023); Maxwell Ambassador, John Maxwell Leadership Foundation


